Minister's Report

Rev. Murray Rounding

Do You Know **Joy**?

As we approach the Season of Christmas we hear and we say words like happy, merry, joyful, glad, as if they are synonymous. Some of them might be, but one of those four stands alone. Merry, Happy, and Glad might stand together as feelings that we experience from one moment to another; they are transitory and sometimes fleeting. They might each be seen as opposites to sad or, unhappy.

One of these words stands quite alone: **Joy**. Rather than a transitory feeling that comes and goes depending on situation or circumstance, Joy is a state of being and a quality of one's Spirit. Contrary to popular thinking, it is possible to experience Joy in life without the presence of happiness, or merriment. At the same time, it is more difficult to experience these fleeting feelings if we do not know joy in our Spirit.

Joy has a strong effect on how we view our world. With all the things that are happening around us every day it is becoming more and more common to hear people talk about the world and life in general using words that paint a picture of darkness and hopelessness. Our world view becomes one without **joy**. Even when we might still find times in our lives to laugh because we are happy, the way we look at and feel about the world is without a joyful Spirit.

For a number of years, I had the privilege of journeying with people with addictions as they walked the paths towards detoxification, rehabilitation and health. One of the most common challenges for these people was finding joy. In many of their stories was a realization that they had no **joy** in their Spirits and that they looked to drugs and/or alcohol to find it. Unanimously they came to the point of discovering that there was no joy in those things, possibly brief freedom from feeling so dark and empty, maybe even something they called a feeling of happiness, but not joy.

One day, I was with a group of people all recovering from an addiction and we were talking about where they found **joy** in their lives. A young mom told me this story:

"One day, my 8-year-old son and I were in the park down by the river. I was sitting on the grass and he was playing around the edge of the water. After a while he came running up to me to show me something he had found. He opened his hand to show me a stone. "Look at this great stone Mom," he said. He was so excited about a stone that seemed to be

nothing more than a really normal gray stone; it did not even have a very significant shape or anything. My son taught me something that day. He taught me what joy is. It is finding greatness in a simple gray stone.”

May you carry **Joy** in your Spirit this season and every season.

Introducing

The Reverend Murray Rounding

The Trinity Transitional Team would like to welcome and introduce The Rev Murray Rounding to our Trinity Community. Many of you have had the opportunity to meet Murray, and his wife Anne, at worship on Sundays or throughout the week. He is very approachable and eager to connect with the Trinity people – so please take time to reach out to introduce yourself if you haven’t already.

I had the opportunity to meet Murray over lunch recently – a few things stood out for me, as “first impressions” walking into his office. Foremost, his warm welcome was evident. His office had the impression of simplicity and decluttering that can come at the start of journey. Also – catching my eye around his office were **classic wooden snowshoes, a beautiful pottery communion set, a picture of beloved black dog and an unidentified large musical instrument in the corner**. All of these items would be reflected on as I asked Murray a bit more about himself to share with the Communicator; we agreed this introduction would describe Murray beyond “the resume”.

And yet, I will briefly mention his experience-filled resume! Rev. Rounding’s resume is impressive indeed. Murray brings a wealth of experience and qualification in the ministerial as well as human support professions. He holds a Diploma in Social Services (Sheridan College), a Degree in Social Development Studies (University of Waterloo) and finished his Master of Divinity Degree at the Atlantic School of Theology in Halifax. Since then he has

completed many certificates, trainings and retreats to help him grow and serve as a United Church minister.

Murray’s resume shows a consistent and yet diverse background in social work, youth work, pastoral / ministerial work and a healthy spattering of carpentry / renovation work interspersed throughout his journey. Murray has worked at schools, treatment centres, community centres, summer camps, and a variety of pastoral charges across the country. It is clear he has worked both “front line” as well as in leadership / supervisory roles in many of these settings.

Murray described how he got into the specific training of Transitional Ministry “out of curiosity” – it was after taking the initial training that he recalls “saying yes” to this vocation. Murray explained that he initially had some hesitation – “I didn’t know whether I wanted to go into a ministry that was so contractual and short term. It isn’t as long-term and relational as I was used to.” And yet, Murray says what drew him to Transitional ministry was the “clarity of goals” and being very intentional about using time to work as a team and congregation toward change, discernment and our future. Further, Murray reflected that he has been part of congregations that “had they had transitional ministry 10 years ago or so” they might have not had to close.

Returning to the objects and symbols in Murray’s office today, the **pottery communion set** connects to how

Murray sees himself as a minister – and that is, in large part, as an “Educator”. Murray reflected on a trip he and his wife Anne took on the Danube River five years ago. He befriended a Jewish rabbi who invited him to share in their Havdalah service. Participating in this worship service, Murray said he understood and recognized the Jewish roots of our communion service. As an Educator and

Minister, Murray feels it is so important to share those connections and help congregations deepen their understanding of why we continue to do certain rituals and what new rituals, or more traditional rituals, we can experience.

In another corner of his office are a pair of **wooden snowshoes**. Murray reflected, that outside of Church he feels most deeply connected to God in creation. Hiking, paddling, gardening are meaningful pursuits for Murray and his wife. The snowshoes (and a canoe paddle) are in fact symbols Murray has selected to represent this time of Transition Ministry with Trinity. Both paddles and snow shoes help us journey with joys and hardship along unknown paths, creating new routes and community in the wilderness.



The unidentified musical Instrument in Murray's office is a **Euphonium**. (Admittedly I had to google it when I got home so I had a reference for what he was talking about). Murray plays the Euphonium and the piano; and he loves to sing. Murray said music is a necessary part of his life. "I need it, I don't just like it," he stated. Murray said he and his wife can tell what kind of mood he is by what music he plays. Murray commented that already, in the short time he has been at Trinity, he is excited and impressed by the musical talent evident in the choir and congregation as a whole.

There is a picture of a **beloved dog**, Samantha, on the wall in Murray's office. Over 30 years ago, when Murray was anticipating moving into his first manse after completing his Master of Divinity – he was asked what he was going to do or buy first upon moving into the manse. Other peer classmates said that they might buy kitchen ware or furniture or other practical items – Murray said he knew he wanted a dog. "I am a dog lover." Sadly, Samantha died a few years ago – yet her memory is forefront in Murray's office.

And finally, there is one other symbol discussed at our lunch meeting. Murray reflected on a simple pleasure in life: **Dark Chocolate**. "I was told by my doctor that it is good for my heart and blood pressure." So, with a "prescription" to enjoy Dark Chocolate (70% cocoa) Murray makes sure he enjoys the daily sweetness of life.

For many people, it is very difficult to find **Joy** in Christmas but rather it is a time of heartache, pain and sadness that has to be endured. So here is a small part of a service that hopefully speaks to that - my gift to you.



AN OLD STORY - A NEW SONG

It is an old story that we have heard many times. It is the story of angels singing to shepherds on a hill, of wise men wending their way from afar, of a manger bed in a lowly stable. It is the story of a song and the story of a star. We hear it again and again and it haunts us still, filling our hearts with an aching tenderness and with a stabbing uneasiness. We cannot escape it. We would not if we could.

It is a story of love and rejection, of joy mingled with pain, a story of faith and light and hope. It is the story of how God became human and came to live among us, to be with the frightened, the lonely and the rejected of our world, to set us free and lead us on to new life, eternally. We need to probe beyond the sentimental and emotional pictures we attach to it to find the deeper meanings of it all. When we open our hearts to make room for God to be born within us, then the star will shine on in us through the darkness of the world and the darkness will not overcome it.

Many people never see the miracle of Christmas. Many are too busy to look up and see the star, too wrapped up in themselves to hear the song of Good News, too involved in looking for Christmas in the stores to make the journey to the manger. And yet, Christmas comes and Christ is born.

For Christmas does not have to be a date.

Christmas does not have to be a place.

For Christmas is where God is and when God is - always and everywhere. In the darkness of the night, the Good News breaks forth and we catch a glimpse of God. The light shines forth and we hear the song once more. For Christmas comes every time we see God in other people. The human and the holy meet in Bethlehem and here on the Main Street of Huntsville. Christmas comes even in the face of hatred, evil and violence. It comes in spite of all that is wrong in our world.

There is no atrocity too terrible to stop it;
No 'Herod' strong enough;
No hurt deep enough;
No disaster shattering enough -
Someone on earth will see the star, someone will hear the angel voices, someone will run to Bethlehem and return, "glorifying and praising God for all they have seen and heard."

For Christmas is God's gift to us of a new song - given over and over again - a chance to ever start anew. It is the unbelievable Good News that we are loved, we are cherished, we are forgiven. Into the shabby stables of our lives, Christ is born. And lo, he is with us always, as he promised he would be.

And we who are the church of Jesus Christ are called to love and affirm each other, to change things and to change lives, to walk with Justice and Mercy. We are the people who are called to open prisons, to heal the sick, to clothe the naked, to feed the hungry, to comfort the broken hearted, to reconcile and resurrect.

We are called to be Alleluias when there is no music.

May the blessings of this season, **Joy**, Hope, Peace and Love, bring you light in the darkness, laughter through the tears, and comfort in the midst of loneliness, pain and sadness. A Blessed Christmas and Happy New Year to all of you.

I’m writing this review with **JOY** in my heart – yes, we are not in bad shape financially at the end of October 31st but since this report was produced, we have spent just over \$5,000 to fix the brick work on the Main Street side of our church, you may have seen the men working there. This was not a planned expense and as

you know, our church building is 121 years old & we have to keep repairing this ole gal!!

Our church has recently borrowed \$12,000 from the Trustees, to help our new interim minister move to our town to be with us for a couple of years while we look at ourselves and figure out the type of a minister that we will want to look for to meet our needs as a congregation. These are exciting times here at Trinity. We will pay this loan back in 24 months.

It has been a fun-filled year with all of the groups and committees who have blown the lid off of the special fund-raising budget – we have reached the budgeted goal already and there are 2 more months to go. Wow – what a year it’s been here at Trinity!!

In closing, the Finance Committee wishes to thank, you, our church supporters for all of your financial support this year and we look forward working together in 2019 to keep Trinity United humming!!

The Trustees are pleased to advise that the sale of the manse property finally closed on October 15th, 2018. It was a long process from accepting an offer in April and going through severance, survey to reworking the inside plumbing and connecting to a new sewer line to the street.

With all the associated expenses now paid, the Trustees have recommended and Church Council has approved, a plan to invest the net proceeds of the sale with TUCC (Toronto United Church Council) and the Toronto Dominion Bank to generate interest income that will be provided to the Trinity United Church general fund for use as required. The Trustees appreciate the guidance and advice from Will Gibson in this matter. The balance of the manse property taxes (about \$630) that were paid to the end of December, has been

refunded by the buyer and turned over to the Trinity United Church general fund.

In other matters the Deep Roots fund that the Trustees have been holding (about \$1100) has been turned over the general fund at the direction of the Deep Roots fundraising committee, to be applied to recent church upgrades.


